





### **Methodology**



#### **Quarterly Tracking Survey:**

- N=1,000 voters nationwide plus n=500-voter oversamples in FL, MI, PA, WI, IA, and OH
- Balanced to U.S. demographics by gender, age, race, income, political ideology, and health coverage
- Fielded online July 19-25, 2019
- National MOE: +/- 3%; State OS MOE: +/- 4%



#### **Key Findings**

- The top issues for 2020: health care (46%), economy (40%), and immigration (40%).
- Lowering COSTS is the top health care priority, and voters believe lowering costs for everyone (60%) is MORE important than providing universal coverage (40%).
- A super-majority of voters (67%) are **SATISFIED** with their current coverage, and 63% believe **PRIVATE** insurance should continue to have a **ROLE** in our health care system.
- More trust the **FREE MARKET** (58%) than government (42%) as the foundation for health care reform.
- More support **FIXING what we have today** (57%) than Medicare buy-in (48%), the public option (44%), Medicare for All (40%), and ACA repeal (33%).



#### **Key Findings**

- Voters' top concerns with new government insurance systems: higher taxes and private premiums and not addressing rising health care costs.
- Most voters would rather **BUILD ON** what is working today (68%) than replace it with something new (32%).
- 67% believe we must **FIX** Medicare **BEFORE** expanding it, and 80% of voters ages 50-64 would rather **KEEP** their coverage than buy into Medicare.
- Most voters 18-64 with private coverage would rather **KEEP** their coverage (70%) than buy coverage through the public option.
  - Most voters (64%) are **UNWILLING** to pay **ANY** more in taxes for universal coverage.

# A majority of insured voters are **SATISFIED** with their health coverage

# Most believe PRIVATE coverage should continue to have a role in our health care system

Many leading Democratic candidates for president have said we need to eliminate the private insurance system entirely – like the coverage that most Americans get through their job. Do you believe private insurance should exist and have a role in our health care system?

### More trust the FREE MARKET than government

# The proposal that earns the MOST support with all voters: Fix what we have today

Fix what we have today. We should build on and improve our current health insurance system – not start over.	57%	62%	62%	49%	58%
<u>Medicare buy-in</u> . We should allow Americans age 50+ to purchase coverage through Medicare.	48%	52%	54%	47%	41%
<u>Public option.</u> We should create a new government-run insurance plan available for every American to purchase.	44%	42%	56%	41%	30%
<u>Medicare for America</u> . We should enroll the uninsured and newborns in a new government-run insurance plan and allow any insured American to buy into it.	40%	42%	57%	34%	24%
Medicare for All. We should replace private insurance plans with a single government-run insurance system that covers all Americans and is funded by federal taxes.	40%	38%	57%	39%	21%

# Voters' top concerns with new government insurance systems: higher taxes/private premiums & doesn't address rising costs

Which of the following potential consequences of government-run proposals to reform our health care system are MOST concerning to you?

Americans will pay higher taxes to fund them and private plan premiums will increase.	40%	35%	42%	45%
They do nothing to lower rising health care costs.	39%	44%	38%	32%
Medicare is already at risk of failing, so we should fix it before we can expand it.	32%	33%	35%	28%
Wait times to see a doctor will increase and access to quality care will decrease.	28%	27%	31%	27%
They put us on a slippery slope towards a one-size-fits-all Medicare for All system.	23%	21%	18%	31%

### FIXING Medicare/aid must come BEFORE expanding it

Expanding access to Medicare and Medicaid now for people no matter their age, income, or where they live	33%	30%	45%	33%	20%



### Over three-fourths of voters ages 50-64 would rather KEEP their coverage than buy into Medicare

Assuming that what you currently pay would be the exact same, would you rather keep your current health insurance coverage or get coverage through Medicare? (age 50-64)

Keep my current coverage	80%	67%	81%	88%
Purchase Medicare coverage	20%	33%	19%	12%



# The vast majority of voters ages 18-64 would rather KEEP their coverage than buy coverage through a public option

Assuming that what you currently pay would be the exact same, would you rather keep your current health insurance coverage or get coverage through a government-run public option? (age 18-64)

Keep my current coverage	70%	65%	65%	80%
Purchase public option coverage	30%	35%	35%	20%



# Most voters would be UNWILLING to pay ANY more for universal coverage

Are you or are you not willing to pay more in taxes to ensure universal health care coverage for every American?

	U.S.	DEM	SWING	GOP
I would not be willing to pay more in taxes than I currently do	64%	51%	66%	79%
I would be willing to pay more in taxes than I currently do	36%	49%	34%	21%
