





Methodology



Quarterly Tracking Survey:

- N=1,000 voters nationwide plus n=500-voter oversamples in FL, MI, PA, and WI
- Balanced to U.S. demographics by gender, age, race, income, political ideology, and health coverage
- Fielded online February 18-26, 2020
- National MOE: +/- 3%; State OS MOE: +/- 4%



Key Findings

- HEALTH CARE remains the top issue of 2020, particularly for Democratic and swing voters.
- 2 Lowering COSTS is the top health care priority for all voters.
- Three-fourths of voters are **SATISFIED** with their current coverage, and 64% believe **PRIVATE** insurance should continue to have a **ROLE** in our health care system.
- Most trust the **FREE MARKET** (60%) more than government (40%) as the foundation for health care reform.
- More support **FIXING what we have today** (62%) than Medicare buy-in (53%), the public option (44%), Medicare for All (40%), and ACA repeal (35%).



Key Findings

- A plurality of voters would be **LESS likely** to vote for a lawmaker who supports MFA or incremental proposals.
- Voters' top concerns with government-run health care reforms: higher TAXES and not addressing rising health care COSTS.
- Most voters would rather **BUILD ON** the **CURRENT** system (66%) than replace it with a new one (34%).
- 80% of voters 50-64 and 69% of voters 18-64 would rather **KEEP their coverage** than buy coverage through Medicare or the public option respectively.
- 72% of voters are **UNWILLING to pay any more for health care** and 66% are **UNWILLING to pay any more in taxes** for universal coverage.

A majority of insured voters are **SATISFIED** with their health coverage

Most voters 50-64 would rather KEEP their coverage than buy into Medicare

Assuming that what you currently pay would be the exact same, would you rather keep your current health insurance coverage or get coverage through Medicare? (age 50-64)

Most voters 18-64 would rather KEEP their coverage than buy into a public option

Most voters – even Democrats – would be UNWILLING to pay any more to ensure universal coverage

Most voters are CONCERNED about the impact of a public option

An independent study has found that the public option could require tax increases on most Americans, including middle-income families, and add over \$700 billion to our federal deficit in its first ten years. How concerned are you about the cost impacts the public option could have on Americans?
